“Our Family Treasure”

Our family treasure, Jane Carroll Lammerman; devoted mother, grandmother, great-grandmother, aunt, friend, and passionate democrat, was born to Jennie Miskimins Carroll and Thomas Joseph Carroll in Wheatland, Wyoming. She was bright, loving, full of laughter, curiosity and mischievousness. She delighted her brothers and sisters; Floyd, Isabel, Bob and Margaret. Her dear sisters died young — Margaret at 17 and Isabel at 26. These profound losses deeply affected young Jane and, no doubt, contributed to the gifts of empathy and compassion that were her hallmark.

Jane graduated from Loretto Heights College in Denver. While there, she met Frank Lammerman, who graduated from Regis, then Colorado University. Their family lived in Southern California; Cut Bank, Montana; and Napa, California; while Frank worked for Union Oil. Jane took tender care of Frank for eight years after a devastating stroke felled him in 1988.

Jane's great courage in the face of life's challenges, her joie d'vivre, devotion to family and deep concern about issues like war and the environment provided inspiration, hope and a great model to those who knew her. She taught school for 20 years after her children left home. In later life, she read a book a day, loved going to St. Elizabeth's, out to brunch and movies and treasured time with family and friends.

Jane is survived by her son, Nick Lammerman and her daughter, Patricia Chandler, with whom she lived her last six years. She had six grandchildren; Liesl Chandler Sallquist, Loch Chandler, Seana Chandler Hickey, Dianna Lammerman Wiseman, Eric Lammerman, Kara Lammerman and 15 great-grandchildren. She love them fiercely. She died at home, surrounded by her loved ones.
