The Church's eschatological preaching is that everything is to be placed underneath the reign of God and that there, within his Kingdom, genuine humanity can be achieved.

Family Faith Sharing Questions

Matthew 22: 15-21

This parable from the Gospel of Matthew points out the relationship between being a good citizen and being a good Christian. All of us have the responsibility to be good citizens of our country. This includes voting, paying taxes, protecting the rights of others, and living by the laws set down by the government. But, sometimes the laws set down in the Bible and by Jesus "bump up against" these laws and create tension for us.

What responsibilities do we have toward God?

How do those responsibilities affect others?

Can you think of situations when these could "bump up against" the laws of the land? Has this ever happened to you? If so, talk about it.
