I BAPTIZE YOU IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER ... UH, I KNOW THIS ... UMMM, THE SON, AND, UH, THE UH, I CAN'T BELIEVE I FORGOT THIS

This episode in Jesus' ministry is shocking. His mother and his brother set out for Capernaum to seize him and bring him back to his senses. We must remember that Jesus passed his first thirty years in the obscurity of an ordinary life. How could his family suddenly accept the fact that the one they had known so well was traveling all over the country publicly making exorbitant claims, correcting the Law and venerable traditions? In fact, this zeal for his Father's house was in no way reasonable and his family had good reason to be disturbed. He would continue to disconcert his relatives and his friends until finally he would reach the supreme folly, the folly of the cross, into which he would drag all of them.

The peremptory judgment of the scribes is serious and disturbing in a different way. They blaspheme against the Holy Spirit, because their error is not simply about Jesus' person and rank. To say that the Son of God works by the power of Satan is to place oneself beyond salvation.

The dilemma still arises – are we for or against Christ?

## **Saint Anthony of Padua, Feast Day June 13<sup>th</sup>**

Saint Anthony of Padua, born Fernando Martins de Bulhões (15 August 1195 – 13 June 1231) is among the most popular of all saints. This has less to do with the memory of his spellbinding preaching than with his posthumous career as a miracle worker. Throughout the centuries Anthony's intercession has been piously sought in matters great and small, with particular homage accorded his knack for locating lost objects.

Anthony's sermons integrated a message of spiritual uplift with a bold challenge to the social vices of the day, especially greed and the practice of usury. He attacked the tyranny of the powerful and was unsparing when it came to the failings of the clergy. "You there, with the mitre!" he addressed one visiting archbishop, apparently in particular need of a prophetic word. He volunteered for hazardous mission tours among the Catharist heretics in southern France. And so successful were his exhortations to charity wherever he preached that he was also well known by the title, "Friend of the Poor."

St. Anthony was one of the most quickly canonized saints in church history, only one year after this death. He was proclaimed a Doctor of the Church on 16 January 1946. St Anthony is venerated all over the world as the Patron Saint for lost articles, and is credited with many miracles involving lost people, lost things and even lost spiritual goods.
