This week's bulletin is dedicated to the memory of Heinke Mehl, a great friend to this parish, who so generously donated the lovely painting of St. Elizabeth of Hungary which hangs in our gathering space.

Heinke left this earthly life on June 29, 2011 to be with the Lord. A memorial service will be held for her this Saturday in California.

Heinke's treasured gift is an outstanding feature of the parish hall. The painting is the work of Joanne Mehl, a well-known Portland artist, and the daughter of Heinke. The painting was originally commissioned by the artist's grandmother for a girls' orphanage in Africa. The grandmother died before the painting was completed, and it sat in storage for many years. The artist's mother, Heinke, retrieved it and persuaded her daughter to finish the work. Heinke determined that it should be given to an organization that would display it with pride. She then called St. Elizabeth Parish and inquired if this was, indeed the church named after the woman Germans know as St. Elizabeth of Thuringia. Fr. Jim assured her that it was the same and gave her a brief history of the parish as a church established to serve patients at the hospitals of OHSU. Heinke decided this truly was the appropriate place to display the painting.

May we always be inspired by Heinke's friendship and generosity, and St. Elizabeth's dedication to serving those with infirmities.

May Heinke rest in peace and may her family know the comfort of the Lord she served so well.

We will have a Death Penalty Repeal panel discussion between masses from 10:00 am sharp to 10:45 am in the Fireside Room here at St. Elizabeth's. The panel will include our State Senator Ginny Burdick, David McNeil, an attorney interested in repeal, and Ron Steiner, chair for Oregonians for Alternatives to the Death Penalty.

The temptation to restrict the Church to the perfect has always haunted the Christian community, animated as it is by a high ideal of holiness. To conquer evil has sometimes been interpreted as meaning to destroy sinners. Many a "holy war" has been fought in the name of Christian righteousness. Even James and John wanted to command fire from heaven to consume the inhospitable Samaritans (Luke 9:54).

Yet the God who has the power to wreak destruction on the wicked rules instead with leniency. In his parables of the kingdom, Jesus teaches his impatient followers that the Lord of the harvest is more concerned with the growth of the wheat than with the elimination of the weeds. The time for separation and for burning will come, but it is not now.

Today's readings call the servants of God's kingdom to share in the patient tolerance of the kingdom's Lord. Rather than devoting our energies to hunting out and destroying every sign of deviation, we are urged to nurture every sign of goodness in the world. To foster the growth of what is good in itself to overcome evil.
